TO THE STAFF, STUDENTS, AND PARENTS OF THE LORD ELGIN
COMMUNITY:

Our fifth year of operation will recall different memories to each of us depending upon our growth and contribution to education at Elgin. There are at least four memories of the school year 1974-1975 that are meaningful to large groups of the Elgin community.

An ever-increasing part of our community is appreciating the special approach to student learning that has characterized our school's short history -- a caring, rational staff-student relationship where formal authority is a course of last resort. It should not surprise anyone, therefore, that the basis of most student pride in their school is the result of the mature staff-student relationship that is typical of Elgin.

For the first time a major program was implemented for the year 1 students new to Elgin.

Average class size was reduced significantly as a part of school policy.

The trend towards increasingly diverse opportunities for students has continued. Some examples of new opportunities include the triple-credit Canada Studies program in Grade 13; the development of total immersion programs and most of all the swimming pool addition -- our largest gift from the community so far.

Finally, the five-year-evaluation of Lord Elgin High School will likely confirm the belief of many educators that semestering, chairmanship organization, resource reallocation and individualized programs are the qualities of the high school which is preparing students for the present and the future.

To the staff of REFLECTIONS, my congratulations and appreciation for the many hours of dedication in producing this fine record of our fifth year of operation.
